On June 24, Nexwsxwníw ntm ta Úxwumixw (Council) approved the On-Nation Home Loan Policy and a new housing initiative: the Hiý ám Home Loan Program (HHLP). This program will provide qualifying Members with a loan guarantee to fund the construction or purchase of a home on-reserve. First explored in 2009, HHLP is an updated initiative that will support the Nation's goal of bringing all Skwxwú7mesh home.

Hiýám Housing will implement and administer HHLP in partnership with Ta na wa Shéway I7xw ta Úxwumixw (Planning & Capital Projects), Ts'ixwts'ixwnítway (Member Services), and Estxwáy usem (Finance & IT). Further details about the application process and eligibility requirements will be shared when finalized.

The Hiýám ta Skwxwú7mesh Housing Society was created on October 8, 2019 with a mandate from Nexwsxwníw ntm ta Úxwumixw to develop and manage non-profit housing for the community, working towards the goal of housing all Skwxwú7mesh within a generation (25 years). As an entity of the Nation, Hiýám Housing Society is accountable to Membership.



On June 10, Ayás Méńmen (Child & Family Services) met with Nexwsxwníw ntm ta Úxwumixw (Council) to present information on the opportunity for Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw to exercise its inherent rights and jurisdiction over child and family services.


Bill C-92, the *Act respecting First Nations, Inuit, and Métis children, youth and families* came into force on January 1, 2020. This federal legislation provides the opportunity for Indigenous people to design and deliver child and family solutions that best suit the unique needs of their communities. On July 29, 2021 Cowessess First Nation became the first to sign a Coordination Agreement under the *Act* and exercise their inherent right to care for their own children and families.

Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw – through Ayás Méńmen programs and services – guides, protects, and provides for our families and children according to our Chiyaxw (Skwxwú7mesh traditional values and culture). From June to December 2021, the Ayás Méńmen Project Team will engage with Membership to present what this unique opportunity means for the Nation and seek feedback.

Some activities the Project Team has conducted include:

- · Consultations with our hereditary Chiefs;
- A survey;
- Continued family meetings, focus groups and workshops.

On June 10, Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw formally called on the Province of B.C. to stop old-growth logging for two years in Skwxwú7mesh Territory while the Nation develops long-term sustainability plans. These forests house intact ecosystems which have re-generated naturally under Skwxwú7mesh stewardship since time immemorial and were never ceded by our people.

While 44 per cent of the Nation's old-growth areas have been protected, 56 per cent remains at risk with at least 20 cut blocks identified for logging activities in the next five years. 78,000 hectares of the Nation's old-growth forest are in danger unless the Province immediately halts new clear cuts.

In 2001, Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw developed the Xay Temixw (Sacred Land) Land Use Plan that highlights the importance of protecting old-growth forests and the need for the Nation to be involved in the economic opportunities of harvesting. Ta na wa Yúus ta Stitúyntsam (Rights & Title) is working to review and update this Plan taking into considering new legislative changes that recognize Indigenous title and rights and feedback from Membership, including Elders and cultural knowledge holders. More information will be shared with the community as soon as possible.




