Attending Chopra Wellness Treatment Centre, Slaxin Lelum and my Counsellor Sara Place have been my biggest factors in my life to be on a fab path.

I enjoy listening to stories and any sharing people like to share with me. I look forward to time together, support people, as previous Band Managers have. I appreciate feedback and direction from history and for future engagement. I will be effective as Band Manager.

I have provided management, sales, and customer service support to various Squamish Nation businesses. I share my cultural leadership, relationship building, event organization, and community engagement skills to recruit and ensure success for Indigenous organizations. I have worked with the Squamish Lil'wat Cultural Centre, Indigenous Tourism BC, Destination BC, and the Squamish Nation Language and Cultural Affairs Department.

Nominee Election Statement

I am running for the position of Band Manager. I know I have a lot to offer our community members and if elected, I would be honoured to work tirelessly to improve our community for the better. I have had the opportunity to work with different organizations to gather knowledge, learn skills, create relationships, and gain various tools to help support our community. I would absolutely work closely with Chief and Council to learn our political landscape and share relevant information so the community feels informed about leadership but also present in a way that is accessible to all members.

I have dedicated my life to furthering the cultural, economic, and geographical interests of our great Nation. Currently serving my third term on Squamish Nation Council, I also act as one of two appointed spokespersons and Chair two of the three Council Committees.

I serve on several Boards supporting the interest of our Nation including the MST Steering Committee, and Chair of MST Employment and Training Society and the Trades Centre Board.

A believer in the power of sport as a catalyst for growth, I am President of the North Shore Indians Lacrosse Club and a loving husband and father.

Nominee Election Statement

I wish to be elected as Chairperson of Squamish Nation to build on all I have accomplished during my twelve years on Council and to continue my life's work of furthering the interests of the Nation. Over my three terms of Council, one as appointed Spokesperson, I have been directly involved with every facet of governance within the Nation, both internally and externally.

I have been extremely proud to have been involved in dozens of initiatives that have set the course for generational prosperity for our Nation, including the establishment of both the Nch'kay Development Corporation in 2018 (which leads the economic development of the Nation), and Hiýám Housing in 2019 (whose goal is to house every Squamish Person within a generation).

Since 2019, Hiy'a'm Housing has completed three new housing complexes (Estítkw Place, Chenkw Emút, and Eskékxwi7ch tl'a Sp'ákw'us Place) and is in the final planning stages of a fourth. And under our Generation Plan, we will break ground on six hundred new homes within the next two years.

In addition to my role on Council, I serve on two of the three Council Committees: The Community Services Committee and the Rights and Title Advisory Committee. Externally, I serve on the West Vancouver Police Board, the NST Steering Committee, and I am the Chair of both the MST Employment and Training Society and the Trades Centre Board. I am also the volunteer President of the North Shore Indians Lacrosse Club and served on the Board of Directors for the 2025 Invictus Games.

I recognize the importance of sport as medicine in our community and was thrilled to recently attend the opening of Kw'eshkw'shétsutay (Playing Place) which represents years of planning and work and will soon become a healthy hub for everyone.

If elected Chairperson, I will build on my previous successes while establishing a strong path for the future. I pride myself on relationship-building and increasing the profile of our Nation. We are now sitting at tables we have never been included in before, but there are still many doors to open. As Chairperson, I will ensure we are invited to those rooms and continue our path to full economic and political independence.

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Biography

I am Darren Baker, grandson of Ray and May Baker, and son of Harry and the late Judy Baker. Growing up with the backing of family and the community openness fostered my caring for our great Nation.

I grew up on Eslha7an, was a dedicated player of lacrosse for 45 years with 14 years of coaching our youth. I attended Sutherland Secondary School and further graduated from the RCMP Cadet Training Program, with over 17 years of service supporting Indigenous communities throughout the Province, and Team Leader, Community Operations Department, for Squamish Nation.

Nominee Election Statement

A Community Safety Platform is a system that aims to improve safety and well-being within the Squamish Nation Community, often involving collaboration between local governments, law enforcement, and residents. These platforms include mobile apps, online portals, or integrated systems that provide tools for anonymously reporting incidents, accessing information, and participating in community initiatives.

The benefits of Community Safety Platforms increase resident engagement, empowering residents to actively participate in maintaining their community's safety, and facilities improved communication between authorities and residents, which provides a more responsive and effective approach to safety and enhancing situational awareness within the Community. Platforms can provide real-time information about incidents and potential threats, allowing for quicker responses, reducing crime rates, and better resources allocation

The Platform will set principles and policies to contribute to addressing the issues affecting the Squamish Nation Community; discontinuing the use of residential homes to make and sell illegal drugs, illegal drug use, open use of marijuana, and all other substance use (including alcohol), within marked drug and alcohol-free areas, more specifically our Nation's schools, community centers and parks. Abolishing usage of residential homes for the making and selling of illegal drugs will certainly contribute to the Community, at large, feeling safe.

The Community Safety Platform will also contribute to fostering unity within our Squamish Nation. By promoting a sense of security and well-being, it can encourage residents to interact more, participate in Community events, and build stronger relationships. This, in turn, can lead to a more cohesive and unified Community environment. When people feel safe, they are more likely to spend more time in public spaces, attend community events, and interact with their neighbours. As well, a unified Community is better equipped to address local issues and work together to find solutions, which reduces stress and anxiety, allowing residents to focus on building positive relationships and contributing to their community.

With my background as a Constable and Corporal with the RCMP, the safety of our Nation for Youth and Elders alike, is very important to me.

Having served remote Indigenous communities within the Province of BC, seeing firsthand the troubles and crises that can and will arise within the generations, I firmly believe that my diplomacy, tactical mindset, and ability to foster strong relationships with our Peoples will garner positive changes to create a safer Community, as well as producing a unified collective within the Squamish Nation.

I endeavor, as a Councilor of the Squamish Nation, to create a unified and protected Community for our Nation as a whole, and have our residents actively and effectively contribute to the theme of Community Safety and Unity.



Kwakwee Baker was born 1972 in Essaouira, Morocco Africa. The son of Frank Baker and Thais (Sewell) Baker, grandparents were Dan Baker of Stawamus and Emily (Nelson) Baker of Kingcome Inlet, Kwakwee is the proud father of 5 boys. A world traveler by the age of eight, Kwakwee never saw things through limited scopes of reality. Exposed to multiculturalism at an early age, he thrived in being creative and understanding the natural world around him, enabling him to develop professionally as an artist and designer.

Mr. Baker was fortunate to grow up in diverse places throughout the world, but found a home at the Capilano Reserve of the Squamish Nation for the past 30 years, while hunting and fishing in the Squamish Valley and connecting with nature.

With a background in film production and directing, Kwakwee is knowledgeable and experiences working with First Nations organizations governments and education committees by creatively allocating available resources, development service plans and reviews and evaluates project process and delivery. As a senior management team member, he upheld provincial tourism hospitality standards by managing financial policies and forecasting, hiring staff and capital assets with tactical planning. Kwakwee also performed access control, risk assessment and safety protocols.

He reviewed and evaluated both existing and proposed government policies regarding self-government, and for First Nations land claims regarding: mining, fisheries, and hunting in Northern Indigenous communities of British Columbia.

I was 17 years old when I met my father Howie "Cookie" Natrall again. Little did I know I opened the door of my past; and welcomed my ancestors into my future.

Honouring Kapaalk (Andy Natrall), grandmother Helen James, mother Christine Natrall, and my father Harold Natrall; I volunteer as an advocate for Species-at-Risk, children & families, vulnerable adults, Elders/seniors, climate, old growth, wild salmon, health, justice, MMIWG2S+, First Nations rights & title.

Working with and for our Skwxwú7mesh stélmexw.

Nominee Election Statement

Nominated by Elder Val Wright, I am running for Council, my name is Lenore Baker (Natrall).

My grandparents were Andy and Helen (James) Natrall. My parents were Harold "Cookie" Natrall and Christine Natrall. To honour the memory, connection and love of my late grandparents and parents, I strive daily to walk in their footsteps of pride, identity, culture, tradition, protocol and honour.

I was raised off reserve, my parents separated when I was 2 years old. Although I have lived off reserve, I was not excluded from the trauma and impacts of residential school, poverty, sexual abuse, alcoholism, drug addiction, domestic violence nor the systemic discrimination and prejudices of the education, health, justice, child protection and policing systems.

The youngest of six, I instinctively chose to fight as my trauma response.

I grew up witnessing the impacts of social, environmental, historical and colonial injustices toward our peoples, my peoples, my family, myself.

How does one convey, in words, enough information about oneself to gain the trust of estranged family and community to run for Council? My Skwxwú7mesh Elder says to speak from my heart...I will do my best.

My father was a St. Paul's residential school survivor. There are not too many photos of my grandparents and parents, so I rely on the memories of our Elders who graciously share their memories and connections to my family which help me to feel more connected to them in my heart and spirit.

As mentioned, I grew up off reserve and faced many trials in my life. I was not privy to being provided with distinct Skwxwú7mesh supports and services. Nor did I grow up having access to my relatives, culture or ceremonies and environmental resources that could help heal my heart, mind and spirit. I had to rely on Western ideologies and practices. I grew up feeling like I never belonged, always looking for HOME.

My father came looking for us when I was 17 years old. He awoke my spirit, and I became hungry for knowledge. I am still hungry. I continue to grow values instilled from my mother. My parents passed when I was 24 years and 36 years old. I now rely on my Skwxwú7mesh Ancestors, Elders, family and kin to continue the learning of our ways, language, history, and protocols. Teachings that reinforce the values passed down to me from my mother; values that I see my children processing as well. I understand and emphasize the struggles our on-reserve kin have endured. I send prayers up for all of our families as we all have our own stories. We need to come together – on and off reserve – to heal as people, as family.

In 2005 I worked for the Shushwap Nation tribal Council (SNTC). It was here where I fell in love with the culture. I like to think of SNTC as an adopted auntie or uncle in the way they showed me who our people are. Where we come from and who we all strive to be for our future by honouring our ancestors, Elders and traditions.



I have worked within colonial government ministries that provide education, financial assistance, child protection and public safety and have seen underlying policies, legislation and colonial practices create barriers to its intended implementations. I experienced mistreatment and witnessed our Indigenous kin subjected to mistreatment in each of these roles.

I have worked for First Nation governments and witnessed the political and colonial barriers faced when asserting their inherent rights to self-govern, socio-economic wellbeing, addressing systemic and colonial laws and policies, protecting cultural heritage, fiscal determination, and preserving language and culture.

I look to culture to balance myself. I go to my Elders for guidance to ground myself, to the land for healing, grounding and connection.

- Help find solutions to our housing, drug & alcohol and poverty crisis
- Support our Elders in using their voices for inclusion, care, roles and contributions to our future
- Bring our off-reserve families home by listening to their voices about housing, employment, culture, resources
- To advocate for free, prior informed consent at all levels of government, industry and organizations, including within our own Nation
- To promote our right to self determination by becoming financially independent (stumpage fees, property tax, licensing control etc.)

I know housing is also an issue and would love a chance to help work on this with our Nation. (In Squamish Valley and North Vancouver, and West Vancouver).

Make sure everyone receives the help for education, employment and training as needed. Everyone deserved the best for their livelihoods and families, everyone deserves to be financially stable.

Band distribution: I know has been the topic also for years. I would like to investigate this budget and see if there can be some increase for everyone in the nation. I know it has been the same amount for years.

Elders: some may need more hours for home makers' help. See if this can be increased. Equality for both Squamish Valley and North Shore areas. Assessments need to happen more regularly. Making sure our Elders get the assistance they need.

Equality for both Squamish Valley & North Vancouver. Take care of our Nation for our future generations to come.



My name is Yul Baker, my ancestral name is Walla-bossama. I'm a member of the Squamish Nation, born and raised in Eslha7an and now living in Xwémelch'stn. I'm the proud father of two children, and my roots run deep through the Baker family – son of Barbara Baker and Murv Smith, grandson of Willis and Nora Baker, and great-grandson of Ray and May Baker. I'm approachable, an active listener, and always honest. I believe in respecting our Elders, uplifting our youth, and being a voice for our people. I'm here to lead with heart, learn with humility, and help bring positive change forward.

Nominee Election Statement

It is with great pleasure that I announce my candidacy for the 2025 Squamish Nation Council. If I am given the opportunity, I stand ready to work alongside our people as an elected official to help strengthen our communities, keep our members safe, and build on the work of past leadership, who came before us for the prosperity of the Squamish Nation.

Since returning home to the lands of our Squamish Peoples at the age of 17, I have proudly lived in the Village of Xwemélch'stn (Capilano) for the past 31 years. During that time, I've seen many changes in our communities – our population has grown, and with it, so have the needs of our people. I want to acknowledge and thank our past and current councilors for their hard work in improving housing and living conditions for future generations.

However, much more work still needs to be done to support our membership.

Community Safety:

As our communities grow, so do our concerns about the safety of our members – especially our children and Elders. I will strongly advocate for our Community Safety Team (CST) to receive proper training in partnership with local police and authorities.

This training would include techniques to safely handle and detain individuals who may pose a threat, ensuring our CST can protect themselves and our members.

I also believe the CST should be equipped with the right safety gear – including protective vests, pepper spray and handcuffs to keep themselves and others safe while waiting for police to arrive.



Community Security Cameras:

In today's world, many of us already have security cameras in our homes to keep our families safe. I believe the Squamish Nation should also install community cameras in our villages – from North Vancouver to the Squamish Valley.

These cameras would be placed at main entrances and busy roads. They help the CST monitor and respond faster in emergencies and deal with any threatening or unwanted situations.

Community Emergency Response Training:

In the wake of a natural disaster such as an earthquake or forest fire – I would strongly advocate for our Squamish Nation Membership to have a volunteer Community Emergency Response Unit. I believe we should have these teams available from North Vancouver to the Squamish Valley to help protect our homes, lands and properties – when outside resources (Fire Departments and Paramedics) are stretched to the limit.

This training can include certified levels of first aid, training for containing fires, evacuating members and bringing them to safe zones.



I am a proud Squamish Nation member, born and raised on our Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw territories. My Ancestral name is Tsiyaliya, Bianca Cameron. I'm married to Bronson Cameron; I am the daughter of Brenda Joseph and the Late Byron Joseph. My grandparents were the Late Stan and Caroline Joseph. My maternal grandparents were Late Norman "Smokey" Adams and Margaret Douglas.

I have served 25 years working for the Squamish Nation people. Each role was geared towards Administrator/Officer positions. My skills include strong leadership qualities and a high level administrative skillset. My knowledge and work experience would always bring well-researched solution-oriented suggestions to any unforeseen situation.

It has been painful as an Elder to witness the distance grow between our Council and our community. With 16 Councilors we cannot go backwards, we must move forward in a way that embraces our cultural values, promotes transparency, and brings our community back together.

Your Elders carry wisdom that cannot be found in books or policies. Our role is to guide, support, and uplift the next generation. I believe we can build a Nation that truly honours our teachings, our identity, and our people.

With your support, I will work to:

- Restore trust and representation in Council
- Advocate for fairness for all members, wherever they live
- Re-establish transparent HR and hiring practices
- Support sustainable economic development rooted in our Nation's values
- Foster intergenerational communication and healing

My Vision and Priorities

Rebuilding Trust and Unity in Our Governance

My first priority is to restore trust, harmony, and unity in our Nation. The current system has strayed from our traditional values. I was part of the team that worked tirelessly to bring the electoral reform to referendum. Restoring a 16-member Council ensures fair representation ensuring power is not held by a select few. We need leadership that respects our Chiefs, Matriarchs, Elders, and community voices.



Equity for Off-Reserve Members

I lived off-reserve for 25 years, so I fully understand the unique challenges faced by members living away from home. We must create fair, inclusive policies that ensure off-reserve members are not left behind in housing, support services, or economic opportunities.



I grew up off reserve in North Delta for 30 years. After school, I entered a welding apprenticeship with a multi million dollar company in South Delta. In 2010, I started my own welding shop and, wanting to serve my people, joined Fisheries on weekends. In 2015, I moved to Capilano Reserve and was later hired as a COVID guardian. My hard work and attention to detail led to roles in Emergency Planning and, eventually, Team Lead of the Community Safety Team. I hold certifications in bylaw, security, project management, and first aid. I am dedicated, hardworking, and committed to serving my community.

Nominee Election Statement

I am running to serve my people because our community deserves better safety, healing, and a future we can count on. I've worked in public safety for the Squamish Nation, and I've seen the truth - we are not doing enough to protect our people from addiction, elder abuse, or financial uncertainty. That's why I'm stepping up not for power, but to get things done.

If elected, I will fight to use the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action to force Canada to fund a Squamish-run treatment center on our land followed by transitional housing that gives people a sober place to rebuild their lives after treatment. Too many of our people get clean and then fall right back into unsafe homes. We can change that.

I will also push to create safe housing for Elders facing abuse or neglect. TRC Call to Action #21 supports healing centers, and we can use that same authority to build a safe space where our Elders are respected, protected, and cared for, away from drugs, violence, or intimidation.

We must also stop the over-hiring of non-Nation staff and put that money back into our people. That money should go toward training and employing Squamish members, and any savings should be invested into proven financial tools like the S&P 500, which has averaged 10% annual returns over its history.

Using the Rule of 72, we can double our money every 7.7 years. If we start now, future generations could live off that fund forever, never having to beg for food vouchers or worry about housing again. It's time to think like investors, not just spenders.

My platform is about protecting our people, helping our community, and building real wealth for the next generations. I'm not running for a title. I'm running to work for you, for our Elders, for those battling addictions, and for every child yet to be born into this Nation.

I also spent part of my childhood in East Vancouver before returning to the Capilano reserve as a teenager. I graduated from Carson Graham Secondary in 1987. While my path didn't include formal post-secondary education, I've learned that leadership can take many forms. Many of our community leaders have relied on traditional knowledge and teachings, which are just as valuable as any academic degree.

I married April Joe, from the shishalh Nation, and together we have two wonderful sons, Brody Johnston and Breed Joe. Through my marriage, I've been blessed to learn strong family and political values of the Joe family, and I'm eager to bring these lessons home to our community. The shared values of family, community, and culture are the foundation of everything I do. Over the years, I've had the privilege of supporting family members in their Chief and Council campaigns and being involved in key decision-making processes within our community. These experiences have deepened my commitment to serving the needs of our people.

For the past 20 years, I've worked as a truck driver at the Heidelberg open-pit gravel mine, and I've also supported my wife in managing her successful janitorial and catering businesses, handling everything from invoicing to scheduling to inventory management. These roles have strengthened my leadership skills, organizational abilities, and my understanding of what it takes to run a business effectively.

Community has always been at the heart of everything I do. I've volunteered at various events, including First Aid, sports events, and have helped transport Elders and other community members to ensure they are well cared for.

I have heard through some of the community members that I have spoken to that the housing system needs some proper attention and should be corrected, such as people being pushed down on the list and not given any reasoning for it. This is something that Nation members take very serious and very personal. I believe that this is a subject and issue that needs to be looked at and rectified. I believe that this issue is as important as keeping our community safe and liveable.

I was taught that I have a voice and that I should use it when I believe it should be used, this is what I will bring to this position. Living in a smaller community for the past 22 years, political issues have become more visible and being part of a very strong political family I was able to be a part of strategy meetings of family members that were running for Chief or Council positions in that community. I was able to see that the issues in their Nation are very similar to the issues that our Nation faces which are COMMUNITY SAFETY and HOUSING issues.

Edward "Anthony" Joseph grew up in Sta'Mus village. His parents are Melody Joseph and Tom Harry. He carries and shares the ancestral name Is'gh'li-ya with his younger brother Russel and cousin Nigale from his Snuneymexw family. For the past 15 years, he has worked in school district #48 as a Male At-Risk Youth Worker, First Nations Support Worker, and Team Leader of the First Nations Support Workers in the Squamish Valley.

Nominee Election Statement

My name is Edward Anthony Joseph, and I am honoured to be a candidate for the Squamish Nation Council in the upcoming election this fall. I serve as Team Leader of the First Nations Support Workers in the Squamish Valley. I have had the privilege of working with the Squamish Valley Education team since 2010. In 2011, I earned a Provincial Instructors Diploma from Vancouver Community College with other education team members when the principal took away the First Nations class at our local middle school. With this diploma, I learned that education truly does open more doors. I returned to school in 2019 to earn my Master of Education from Simon Fraser University in 2021. After completing my Master of Education Degree, I could not wait to enter the Skwxwú7mesh sníchim program at Simon Fraser University the following term. I earned my Language Proficiency Diploma from Simon Fraser University in 2023. I have always been passionate about our Squamish Education team and its mission to make school a safe environment for our indigenous learners to feel proud of who they are. As a result, they can build resilience to walk in two worlds by learning and practicing their culture.

My journey with the Squamish Valley Education team began 15 years ago when I joined as a Male At-Risk Youth Worker. Over the years, I have learned Skwxwú7mesh sníchim, Skwxwú7mesh art, Skwxwú7mesh ceremony and protocols, how to be a voice for the community, how to be a voice for my education team, wool weaving, cedar weaving, traditional stories, leatherwork, learn and create Indigenous artwork, and practice traditional drum songs and dances.

With 15 years of experience in education, I have developed a deep understanding of how we are building and holding up tomorrow's leaders by helping them regain their inherent right to their culture. My education career has included roles such as Being an advocate for Indigenous students, Male-At-Risk Youth Worker, Boys Group Leader, Culture Camp Leader, Squamish Valley PAC member, Lead Singer of Welh Tima Kexwusem, Lacrosse coach, Drop-in Basketball Program Facilitator, and Traditional Speaker for many different ceremonies such as pole raisings, blanketing, celebration potlatches, and funerals. Wearing multiple hats within the community has allowed me to gain insights into Squamish Nation's operations and our members' needs.

I am known for my approachable presence and personable personality. I am an active, patient listener who leads with integrity, empathy, patience, dedication, and teamwork. I am committed to bringing these values to my role as a Councillor. My approach is always transparent, and I am willing to listen to the concerns of Squamish Nation community members, which is essential for fostering a collaborative and inclusive environment.

If elected, I will focus on finding a way for everyone to receive equitable services and support no matter where our Squamish Nation's members live. I would also like to support education by helping to spark interest in more Squamish Nation members to become Indigenous teachers of language and culture. I would also like to prepare our youth to nurture their gifts so they can attend post-secondary education and then come back and contribute to our community.



In doing so, I would also like our Nation to plan and create positions in advance so that our youth who earn a post-secondary degree will have positions ready to be filled. I will help alleviate the stress of our housing issues as well. A great starting point would be to look at relations with the BC Housing Society and other housing relations to ensure we maximize our housing opportunities for all members, regardless of marital status. I will also advocate for improving our cultural community, such as the Shaker Church. Shakers are the closest spiritual support we have to an Indian doctor. They always support our families by supplying medicine with bells, candles, and songs. However, there are just a handful of dedicated Shakers, and the workload can sometimes be tiresome for such a small group.

They will need increased numbers of community members to continue the good work. Youth active in extracurricular activities can always use extra support to make their way to the destination of their activities, such as canoe club, rugby, lacrosse, basketball and soccer. I know the Squamish Nation will build a longhouse and an Elder's center on Sta'Mus village, but I will ensure these projects arrive on time.

I raise my hands in thanks for considering my candidacy. I am excited to potentially serve the Squamish Nation people by contributing my skills and passion to our people's shared success. Thank you for your time and consideration.

Vision Statement

Committed to advancing self-determination, community wellness, and sustainable prosperity for the Squamish Nation. I bring over 25 years of legal, governance, and economic development experience, rooted in working with and for First Nations. I seek to serve Squamish Nation Membership with integrity, transparency, and vision – building on Skwxwú7mesh values and traditions while securing a strong future for the next generations.

Why I am running

Today too many members feel disconnected from the Council and Administration. There is a feeling that Skwxwú7mesh history is overlooked and colonial systems and identity are favoured. Despite a very large administration many members feel ignore and services don't appear to reflect Skwxwú7mesh values.

To pass on a strong Skwxwú7mesh identity to future generations, we must focus our government and administration building on Skwxwú7mesh history, language, and traditions. I have the skills, experience, and commitment to help make needed changes. My goal is to return power and voice to the people.

I believe the council should have – and will advocate – the following priorities.

Honouring Skwxwú7mesh identity:

- Requiring that Skwxwú7mesh Language, culture and values and membership priorities are at the core of all existing programs and services
- Involving Skwxwú7mesh traditional leaders in programs and decision making, particularly on lands, Title and Rights and protection of sacred sites
- Supporting programs for youths and adults to learn Skwxwú7mesh language and stewardship of traditional territories through land based cultural camps and mentoring
- Elected council with the support of traditional leaders must take a strong stand to protect Skwxwú7mesh territory and rights from all who attempt to assert a claim or interfere with Skwxu′7mesh territory and rights



An Accountable Council and Administration

- All areas of administration should undergo an independent performance review and must justify staffing levels and expenditures with results reported to Membership
- Membership must have meaningful input into the Policies adopted by council, including Governance Policy
- Council decisions which impact rights, title, identity and land should require free and informed consent of Squamish membership
- Gaps in accountability to members, due to council transferring Squamish Nation assets, including rights, to independent Boards of Directors must be addressed
- A compliance review on Nation Bylaws as well as legal standards in the areas of Access to information; Privacy; Safe Workplaces; Whistler Blower procedures; with results reported to membership

Protecting and Supporting Members

- Develop a strategy to promote the return of off reserve members to Skwxwú7mesh communities
- Review use of OSR with the requirement there is equity in treatment of all members; age groups; and communities
- Work with membership, law enforcement, health and social services and administration to develop an actionable and measurable strategy to increase safety and reduce harmful behaviour, particularly substance abuse
- Consult with members on a strategy for shutting down drug dealers in the community, including considering a Bylaw on penalties and enforcement
- Hold monthly members meeting with members' give members the opportunity to set the agenda; and return to custom "Members Day" meetings

Our Nation is ready for renewal. I believe we can make the Squamish Nation strong again—not by repeating the past, but by building on the wisdom of our ancestors and moving forward together. I am ready to take on this responsibility—not for myself, but for our people, our youth, and the generations to come. I ask for your support, your guidance, and your voice, as we walk this path together.

I stand ready to serve on Councilgrounded in spirit, guided by values, and committed to all generations of Squamish.

Nominee Election Statement

I am running for Council to meet the needs of our members–with Elders as my top priority. Our Elders deserve improved services, from home care to meaningful companionship. I propose the development of an Elder Care Centre, staffed by certified and trained Nation members and families, to ensure the ongoing health and wellbeing of our cherished Elders.

Housing: I will advocate for the rights of all members – on and off reserve – to have safe, affordable housing. As MST projects create new homes, I'll ensure Squamish Nation members receive equal allocation alongside partner Nations. I support alternative builds (e.g. shipping containers, 3D-printed homes) to accelerate housing on unused or underutilized lands. I also propose a home maintenance program for existing Nation properties, with regular inspections, minor repairs, and upgrades to ensure safety, comfort, and code compliance.

Safety: I will review and implement enforceable safety policies, with proper training for community Safety Patrol staff–covering de-escalation, violence prevention and community engagement. I propose guarded entrance checkpoints for high-risk areas, stronger partnerships with police and community organizations, and removal of known illegal activity sites on Nation lands. Let's empower block watch programs that foster connection and accountability: know your neighbours, protect your community.

Youth: Every youth deserves to grow in a safe, rich environment rooted in Squamish culture. I will champion education, trades, arts, sports, and life skills–developing summer work programs, post-secondary internships, and partnerships with both government and private sectors. I propose hiring youth for summer home maintenance crews and supporting tourism collaborations to showcase Squamish culture. We can organize sports tournaments, camps with pro teams, and mentorship programs focused on personal growth and empowerment.

Arts & Culture: I'm passionate about showcasing our culture across our traditional, ancestral, and unceded lands. I will advocate for more opportunities for our artists–both emerging and established–to be featured in community and international settings. We must support cultural and economic exchanges through tourism and partnerships with government and businesses. The world comes to our lands to experience who we are. Let's rise to meet them.



Membership: I believe we must revisit our membership policies. Our Nation's numbers have declined, and we risk losing strength for future generations. Administration: I will review all Nation programs and services for quality, efficiency, and integrity. This includes job descriptions, qualifications, certifications, training, and budgets. I will educate myself and listen to our people to improve service delivery. We must prioritize hiring qualified Squamish members–many of whom have applied in the past and bring value post-secondary and trades skills. Let's invest in our people to build a strong future for our children.

It is our sacred duty to stand as protectors to safeguard our lands, lift our languages and carry our cultures forward with pride and strength for the generations yet to come.

I want our youth to continue these legacies with pride. We need to keep and improve spaces for our recreation, and create opportunities to host sports events, soccer tournaments, lacrosse tournaments, and canoe races right here on our lands. These activities bring us together, teach our youth discipline and culture, and strengthen our community spirit.


