Keeping Community Informed

Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumíxw has a similar regulatory role as the provincial or federal governments in oversight of the **Woodfibre LNG Project** and **FortisBC Eagle Mountain Gas Pipeline Project**. The role, and 33 conditions, are part of the legally binding Squamish Nation Environmental Assessment Agreements (SNEAAs). Our Rights and Title Department oversee the conditions of the agreements and are committed to keep Membership informed and updated on these projects.

More information about Flaring

Flaring is expected to start at Woodfibre LNG in mid 2027

Ta na wa Yúus ta Stitúyntsah (Rights & Title) staff are continuing to share information about [Woodfibre LNG flaring](#). This update focuses on what you would experience during Woodfibre LNG flaring when standing at St'á7mes Reserve.

Locations with a direct view of Woodfibre LNG (such as Britannia Beach and Furry Creek) will see the full flame. The flame itself may be partially visible from St'á7mes and not visible from the downtown Squamish area.

For Members to get a sense of what flaring might look, sound and smell like if you were standing at St'á7mes, we have included information from Woodfibre LNG below.

What to expect Standing at St'á7mes

See glow

Flare may be partially visible in some circumstances during the day. A glow would be visible at night if the facility is flaring, such as from a dim parking lot.

See smoke

Flare is designed to burn smokeless but black smoke will occur during specific commissioning activities.

Hear

The flare will be heard in some locations above ambient conditions, such as in Britannia Beach.

It should not be heard above ambient noise levels in St'á7mes.

Smell

Odour is not expected outside the project site (it would smell like car exhaust).

Q&A

What are Woodfibre LNG doing to reduce flaring?

Woodfibre LNG will be required to minimize flaring as much as possible and provide records to confirm their actions. Compared to LNG facilities powered by natural gas there will be less flaring at swiyát because Woodfibre LNG will:

- Use an electric powered system which means:
 - Less maintenance (therefore less flaring)
 - Shorter flares when restarting
- Use flare tip technology to burn gas more efficiently and minimize smoke
- Reuse and recycle gas where possible
- Commit to 22 flaring mitigations with BC Energy Regulator.

How do you want to be notified about flaring events?

Please specify how you'd like to hear from Woodfibre LNG during flaring events, whether that is in Elder or Family Meetings, social media (Facebook), newsletters, website, or in another way when they happen.

When public consultation starts this fall regarding Woodfibre LNG's waste discharge authorisation permit application (which will include flaring) Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumíxw will keep Community informed of the dates.
